Course Title: Research Writing

Course Preamble:

Generally, most of the time research writing takes place at a tacit level, and a student is expected to know the conventions and styles of research writing implicitly, without any explicit exposure to writing techniques, which in turn results in a messy unstructured writing. This course aims to specifically to target this lacuna. Although different disciplines in the Humanities have their own methodological specificity, lucid writing is an indispensable requirement for clear communication of ideas. The course envisages helping the students develop a conceptual framework, structure arguments, formulate, position and negotiate a discourse, report and use data, and reference and cite. It would include emphasis on strategies to revise, redraft and edit. Envisioned to be rigorous writing course, it would emphasise fluent and creative writing, have recourse to peer feedback, and group editing via group discussions.
